It is amazing to think of all of the members involved with a production like Jack of Diamonds (JoD). It begins with our play reading events. Generally, there are 15 to 20 members that join us in reading plays. When the reading is over, we analyze the play. It may be decided it is one the Board should consider adding to our season, and if that is the case, it is discussed by our seven Board members. If we vote in favor of adding it to our season, we then open it to searching for a director. In the case of JoD, because of travels, we chose Co-Directors. They then chose their stage manager. Once we have reached this point, the three-member Promotions Team, spins their magic. The two set designers and construction leads, create the set. The director or directors hold auditions and select a cast. In the case of JoD, the cast included eight members. During most of our rehearsals, our props and backstage team, made up of six members, attend to facilitate rehearsals. Make-up had five members. We had a team of twelve members construct and strike the set. The sound crew totaled seven members. We like to end the production run with a cast/crew party, which for JoD included five members who made up the Hospitality team. For JoD that totals 78 members. Granted, several members performed multiple roles, but the bottom line is that it takes a lot of our members to do a major mainstage production.

In addition to these mainstage productions, we also do smaller productions which include Murder Mysteries, Cabaret Singers, Readers Theater, Twig Theater, Radio Theater and we are adding more. These smaller productions may not require as much help as is needed for our mainstage productions, but they still require quite a few members.

There may be times you wonder why we are not reaching out for your help. It may very well be that we have so much going on, we don't have the time to reach out. If you want to help, please send an email to pelicanplayers.rep@gmail.com and let us know what position you are willing to volunteer your help. I am sure we can find a spot for your assistance. It would be greatly appreciated. Don't forget, as a member, this is YOUR Pelican Players Community Theater.












SCRIPT READERS MEET TO READ "VANYA AND SONIA AND MASHA AND SPIKE"




DRAMS OF SHAKESPEAR



A NEW WAY OF ADVERTISING

We tested a new way of advertising prior to the run of "Jack of Diamonds". Facebook offers a "Boost Post". It is a paid advertisement that promotes an existing post from a business page to a wider audience. This is a simple way for a post to reach more people. We were able to target specific areas around Sun City Center based upon surrounding cities and/or zip codes. We set a budget of approximately \$50.00 and tested this approach.

Prior to using Facebook's "Boost Post", our posts were reaching about 440 users (based upon the previous 10 posts). The post that we targeted was seen on screen 9,063 times with 5,380 users viewing it at least once and 877 users engaging, reacting, commenting, sharing and clicking on the post.

We liked the results of this test and made the decision to use it for all main stage productions.





TREASURER'S DONATION REPORT

My first full-time job was as a middle school teacher of social studies in inner-city Chicago. After two years, I was moved to an inner-city high school where I taught history for seven years. I enjoyed teaching, but desired a doctorate. With the doctorate, I went to university teaching in California, Alabama, and Chicago. I also was Vice-President of an educational foundation in San Francisco. This involved me in extensive travel to promote economics education. After teaching at Alabama University, I returned to Chicago to help family and took a position as Coordinator of Precollegiate Law-Related Education for the American Bar Association. While in that position, I met Stedman Graham, a Chicago businessman. He hired me to be Vice-President of his new speaking business. After several years doing that I moved back to a college position becoming founding faculty member of the university's new doctoral program. In this position, I taught only doctoral students and advised their dissertations. Retirement came in 2013 and a move to Sun City Center followed. In the course of these various positions, I have written a dozen curriculum guides and eight published books. Currently, I am editor-in-chief of an international professional journal, The Social Studies.

When and how did you find out about The Pelican Players?

My first acting experience was as a freshman in high school. Acting was so enjoyable that I appeared in plays throughout high school and community college. Later when an older person was needed, I appeared in a variety of college plays. After moving to Sun City Center, I saw and took a course on acting and was introduced to Pelican Players. My first audition landed me a part and I have participated ever since.

The best part of Pelican Players is the wonderful people who participate. Next, I love the acting. I have appeared in main stage plays, readers theater and murder mysteries. 
