Welcome to 2025, but before we delve into this new year, let's take a quick look back at 2024. We performed three mainstage productions, FLAMINGO COURT, JACK OF DIAMONDS and THE WITCH IN 204 to approximately 3,500 audience members in 2024. We donated \$1,000 to the SCC Emergency Squad during Flamingo Court, \$1,000 to Samaritan Services during Jack of Diamonds and \$1,000 (which was matched to become \$2,000) to CFTB Hurricane Relief during The Witch in 204. We also performed 22 Murder Mystery shows which were all written by our very talented Vice President, James Williams. We performed several Readers Theater shows with free admission to thank our community for 43 years of support. We performed a Cabaret Singers show. We joined with Diane Keyes Literacy Alliance in reading events to area pre-schools. We held numerous play reading evenings to help us choose shows to perform in the future. We continue recording radio shows which were broadcast monthly on Sun Radio and WKOT Radio. When you add in the many auditions, rehearsals and meetings that went along with all of that, it was a very busy year. We thank all of you that became involved and helped us.

Our first mainstage show in 2025 will be two shows, DRAMS OF SHAKESPEARE and DESPERATE HOUSEWIVES OF SHAKESPEARE. Whether you liked or didn't like studying Shakespeare in school, you haven't seen Shakespeare like this. Our second mainstage show will be BERMUDA AVENUE TRIANGLE, and our final mainstage show of 2025 will be THE ODD COUPLE: FEMALE VERSION.

In addition, for 2025 we will be doing five free Readers Theater events along with a Cabaret Singers show. We expect 2025 to be as busy as 2024. 

AN INTERVIEW WITH HARRY BURGESS

On October 26, you performed a Mark Twain show in the Veterans Theater as part of our Readers Theater. You did an outstanding job. What made you pick Mark Twain?

Mark Twain's insightful, humorous and poignant reflections on society and the nature of man are just as relevant today as they were when Twain began his lecture series in October 1866. Because of this, I feel compelled to keep the work of Twain alive by introducing him to new audiences who may know nothing of Twain and re-introducing him to those who have embraced his work. Mark Twain not only makes us laugh, but more importantly, makes us think. I am grateful to the Pelican Players for giving me the opportunity to bring Mark Twain to the stage.

Have you been a fan of Mark Twain? If so, what was it that first drew your attention to Twain? I have been a fan of Mark Twain since childhood when I found Huckleberry Finn to be the most interesting and entertaining of his stories. After seeing Hal Holbrook's solo performance as Twain on television in the late 1960's, I became a student of Twain. I was drawn to his work on the lecture circuit and to Mr. Holbrook's solo performance based on years of research into the life and works of Mark Twain.

How did you prepare for the show? How did you transform yourself, your voice, etc. for this character? The first thing I considered was whether or not I could physically look enough like Twain to make his appearance believable. This involved examining many pictures of Twain and reviewing Holbrook's performance. There are no known recordings of Twain's voice but the actor William Gilette, who was Twain's neighbor as a child, recorded an imitation of Twain's voice in 1934. That recording of an old man with a slow Missouri drawl was studied as well as the voice of Hal Holbrook. Role preparation required hours of focused memorization and refinement which I don't believe I could have accomplished without my wife's assistance and support. She endured hours of memorization, refinement and repetition.

What lessons have you personally learned by studying Mark Twain? I have learned that solo acting is not for the faint of heart and that is why most actors won't attempt it. The amount of focus and rigorous preparation requires a great deal of self-discipline. I realized that it is difficult, without another actor to play off of, to maintain audience engagement and maintain the momentum of the work. All of these things have presented momentous challenges to be overcome.

Thank you, Harry. We hope to see more of Mark Twain in 2025!







IN HIS OWN WORDS - RON DEITSCH

Where are you from?

I grew up in The Bronx, NY

What are your life experiences, e.g., jobs, family?

I received a degree in Music Education from Lehman College in the Bronx. While in college I was part of the Musical Theater Society and was in all the shows they performed. I was musical director for some of the shows (Jaques Brel is Alive and Well, Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum and Minnies Boys). After college I taught Band and Chorus in Middle School in upstate NY and Houston, Texas. I played two years in a 50's Rock and Roll show band. After getting married to my wife, Hope, we moved to Houston, TX and had our two children, Becky and Brian (who gave us our 3 grandchildren). I switched careers from teaching to computers. I started off in sales and finally ended up in corporate IT as a System Engineer. We moved to Tampa, Florida in 1988 and then to Kings Point in 2004 before retiring in 2014.

When and how did you find out about The Pelican Players?

The first thing I did when we moved to Kings Point was to look for a theater group. I found Pelican Players in the community guide and quicky joined.

What is your experience with The Pelican Players and what is your favorite thing about belonging to this group?

My first activity for the Pelican Players was working backstage for a mainstage production. I have performed in the Follies and a few Ed Brown shows. I was in the last musical put on at the Rollins Theater. I have also performed in Readers Theater and was co-director for a time. I formed the Cabaret Singers in 2017 and will continue to put on shows for as long as I can.

Where are you from?

I grew up in Long Beach Island, NJ. I have lived in New York City and Montclair, NJ before marrying Rick Swenson. We then lived in Cedar Rapids, IA, Bettendorf, IA, Mount Laurel, NJ, Thurmont, MD, Fairfield, PA and then in August 2010 we moved to SCC, FL.

What are you job experiences? I had a wonderful childhood growing up on a barrier island, LBI, NJ. Following High School in Manahawkin, NJ, I went to school at the Fashion Institute of Technology in NYC. I had one sibling, a brother who was tragically killed in an accident many years ago.

I started my career in interior design at the age of fifteen. I worked for Sink or Swim on LBI and quickly moved into doing the displays in their store. They moved me to Del Ray Beach, FL to set up their new store there. In August of 1973, I was maid of honor in a wedding that Rick Swenson was best man. On June 16,1974, we wed.
